You no longer have to include long (and
ugly) URLs in your documents! As an
interesting—and impressive—variation,
create a QR code!



One tip— the longer the URL, the more complex the QR code will be, and the longer it will take to scan. To avoid this, paste your insanely long URL into a URL shortener first (such as <u>Bitly</u>, <u>Google URL Shortener</u>, <u>TinyURL</u>, etc.), then copy/paste the shortened URL into the QR code generator to get a simpler, and faster-to-scan QR code!
